Have the following information ready when making a reservation

- Park name and type of site required (e.g. Electrical, lakefront or interior)
- Arrival and departure dates
- Type and size of camping equipment (e.g. trailer length)
- Your name, address, postal code and telephone number
- Number of people who will be camping
- Method of payment (i.e. credit card number and expiry date)

Call 1-888-ONT-PARKS to make a reservation for car camping sites, interior campsites, and roofed accommodations (yurts, cabins, cottages).

Call Bronte Creek Provincial Park at 905-827-3228 to make reservations for group camping.

A non-refundable reservation fee of \$12.00 is a small price for convenience.

To cancel or change, call 1-888-688-7275. A \$9.00 fee will be charged.

Bringing your own supply of firewood to the park this summer?

Please read this.

Firewood often contains insects and plant diseases. Campers who bring firewood from home may accidentally spread those diseases that threaten Ontario's provincial parks and the health of our forests.

The Asian longhorned beetle and emerald ash borer are of particular concern. They are both recent arrivals to Canada and without natural controls here.

While the emerald ash borer is currently believed to be confined to southwestern Ontario and southeast Michigan, where it has killed millions of ash trees, the movement of firewood has been the main culprit in its rapid spread in both the U.S. and Canada over the past year. As a result, the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) has imposed a quarantine, which prohibits the movement of firewood to areas outside of Essex County. The Asian longhorned beetle has been found attacking hardwood trees between Vaughan and Toronto. Both insects can be easily spread in firewood, which may look normal, but still be infested with the insects.

How you can help:

- Do not move firewood, especially firewood obtained from areas under quarantine such as Essex County and the U.S.
- Buy firewood from the area you are visiting.
- Ask your supplier where their wood comes from.
